Dear Friends,

As the Bible says, there is a time for everything, and it is time for me to retire from my post as Minister of Condorrat. This will not be news to many of you reading this as I have already announced this to the Board and Session and the Congregation, however, not everyone will have heard and this is why I am telling you now. I have written to Presbytery and all the appropriate channels have been informed. The die is cast and the date is set for the 31st August 2022.

You might think that this is a long time away but it gives everyone time to start working on the next step in the life of the Church here in Condorrat. I want to confirm that this decision has not been made lightly and has included a great deal of prayer and thought but I am sure that you will understand that when the time comes to move, you just know when it is right.

Having said that life still goes on in the church and we have much to do as the year rolls on. This Sunday is not only a Celebration of Holy Communion but the first Sunday of Lent. This means that we embark on the journey of Faith, Prayer and Reflection on our Spiritual Life as we consider what to give up, or what spiritual exercise we choose to take up. This is a time of sacrifice and prayer which reflecting the forty days and nights that Jesus spent in the wilderness where He prayed and lived through the difficulties of living in the desert.

We are fortunate that life is starting to return to normalbut not quite in the church yet. I have copied the information which the Scottish Government has issued, and it is quoted in the Church of Scotland Web-Site's latest update from the 28th January. There is little change at the moment with a cautious approach because Covid levels are still quite high, therefore the advice is as follows:

"Face coverings remain mandatory in most *indoor public places – including places of worship* - subject to exemptions. They continue to be an important part of stopping the spread of coronavirus and should be worn correctly. Those responsible for places of worship should encourage worshippers and members of the public to wear face coverings in line with the requirements on individuals.

Physical distancing is recommended during worship wherever possible, unless it interferes with a fundamental aspect of faith specific practice.

We strongly encourage people to take a lateral flow test before attending services or gatherings. Places of worship may wish to continue to collect visitor details for the purposes of supporting NHS Scotland's Test and Protect System. Ensuring adequate ventilation in buildings also remains an important precautionary measure."

So we keep the masks and social distancing of one metre and track and trace, and it makes sense to get tested before coming to a Sunday Service. We shall one day return to the way we were, but not yet, so that we can keep each other safe; and that is the most important thing, to care for each other.



The Session and Congregational Board met this month, but before the meetings Grace informed us, as a Congregation, that she plans to retire at the end of August. I'm sure you will hear more about the procedure this will involve, but she let us know in Session that she has informed Glasgow Presbytery and has received a response from the Presbytery Clerk to say that an Interim Moderator will be appointed shortly to help with aspects of the Vacancy.

The Minister is meeting with the Headteachers of Baird Memorial and Westfield Primary Schools to arrange Assembly talks, so things are beginning to regain some normality.

Mrs Boland has been preparing materials for Condorrat Primary to tell the story of Easter.

Mrs. Kenny has been preparing our Annual Accounts and a Date for our Annual Stated Meeting will be announced shortly. It is a requirement of every congregation that they be presented with accounts so that everything is open for all to see and question if they are unsure of anything. It is also our opportunity to elect new Members to the Congregational Board. If you would like to be

involved in the running of our Church and feel you may have a contribution to make, or even suggest someone you think has the qualities required, we would love to hear from you. We can explain what is involved so you can decide if it's for you.

There is little else to report but as you will read elsewhere the 'Technical Team' are still working to improve the sound quality and "drop out" on our online services. I know they have had many meetings, and much frustration. Good things come to those who wait! (or so we are told)

After-church Tea/Coffee has now resumed with Covid restrictions still in place. However, as the Westminster and Scottish governments are planning to 'ease' restrictions (at the time of writing) we await further advice from the Church of Scotland. The advice is only that, and as a congregation we can decide whether or not to adhere to it. I'm sure we will make decisions with our own safety and that of others in mind.

Please keep our Church and our Community in your Prayers as we anticipate the changes likely to take place in the Cumbernauld Group of Church of Scotland Parishes.

From the Treasurer

March 2022

Dear Everyone,

The Accounts of the Guild and the Sunday School have been internally audited and found to be correct. I thank those responsible for submitting these Accounts by the due date and the Internal Auditors for carrying out this very necessary duty, promptly. The Church Accounts are almost complete and will be ready to be independently examined within the next few days.

Where did February go? There are fewer days in that month but, to me, the first half seemed to disappear in no time in a mixture of rain, hail, sleet and snow – sometimes within minutes of each other - and the last two weeks in a storm. What is amazing is that snowdrops and crocuses, which look so fragile, are blooming in spite of the battering they have had from the wind. Isn't nature marvellous? Let us rejoice in the positives we see around us.

The Schedule of Financial Statistics was completed and returned to the Church of Scotland along with confirmation that the form for our Ministries and Mission contributions had been handed in to RBS. An email was sent requesting confirmation that these forms had been received.

The music licence dispute has not been resolved and is still being pursued. Why we should pay for a music licence when we were closed, is the question they seem unable/unwilling to answer. In my most recent telephone call to PPLPRS, I was informed that the required form had not been received by them. When this form was described, I was able to tell them that we had never been asked to fill in a form like that.

A form is now, apparently, in the post and when it arrives, it will be completed and returned to them with yet *another note* of when the Sanctuary and Halls were closed. They have been informed on numerous occasions of these closure dates but the problem seems to be their lack of co-ordination as I speak to someone different every time I phone.

Our Presbytery dues for 2022 (£1793) have been paid to Glasgow Presbytery. This amount is more than double what we paid when we were in Falkirk Presbytery but, from what I have been told by someone who is a member in a Church which has been in Glasgow Presbytery for years, the Presbytery staff are very supportive and more than willing to help with any problems.

Having received an email from the Church of Scotland regarding Webinar Meetings for Treasurers, I did the course. Unfortunately, it was more theoretical than the practical help I would have appreciated and, also, it turned out to be for the whole country and all charities, so it was very wide ranging. However, several pieces of information *did apply* to us and, I am pleased to say that we were already doing most of them. The others have been addressed.

Not long after you read this edition of "Parish News" the clocks will be going *forward*. Let us all look forward to more light in the evenings and, hopefully, less severe weather conditions and we give thanks to God that we have not been as badly affected by the Storms as some people whose lives have been devastated.

The Prayer Corner

March 2022

"At once the Spirit made him go into the desert, where he stayed forty days, being tempted by Satan. Wild animals were there also, but angels came and helped him."

Mark 1: 12-13



This very succinct rendering by Mark of the Temptation of Jesus in the Desert describes a time of preparation of Jesus for His Ministry to the world. Behind these words is a wealth of information about temptation; about leaving the past behind and setting out to a new venture.

The loneliness and sparse vista of the desert lends itself to contemplation and self – examination, in which the person is made to find themselves as they really are. It truly was the best way of preparing for the times ahead. Times that would be difficult and dangerous, yet Jesus held out against the temptations of the Devil and showed in His demeanour and in His answers the perfect way to deal with these things.

He quoted the Bible at all times and countered the evil suggestions with good and true thoughts. He overcame the temptations through His trust and in Relationship with God. There is something else we should always remember about Jesus in the desert. He was led there by the Spirit, and this gave Jesus the proper opportunity to Pray and to Be with the Father.

His demeanour and His answers are such a lesson for us who also journey through Lent, we are encouraged take time to be with the Lord, to overcome evil with good. To give up something as a sacrifice during Lent to reflect Jesus' journey in the desert, or take up something which brings us spiritual insight. May our journey this year help us to come closer to God and to find what needs to be changed within ourselves.

FAMILY DEVELOPMENT WORK/
OUTREACH

March 2022

Hi Folks,

Our user group of Messrs Reynolds and MacKenzie, Mrs Doran and myself have now had several training sessions in use of the 'digital equipment'. We have encountered some grentims in the system which, if one were to watch it on livestream, would present themselves as 'drop-outs' or buffering of the signal. This is due to our mobile phone's Wi-Fi unit's signal not being strong enough to carry the upload speed from the laptop and camera. While the mobile Wi-Fi was fine when using our smart-phones to livestream, the camera and laptop are more sophisticated. In order for us to retain a signal for the length of a worship service or similar we need to consider installing broadband.

I have applied for funding from NLC from the Flexible CVS Digital Fund. This is a fund which can give up to a £1000 for any charity asking for digital software or hardware which would help further their work. I'm still waiting on a reply to our application, but hope it will successful.

I hope however that folk have had a chance to view our new equipment on the livestream. If you have, I'm sure you've enjoyed the better angle that the new camera offers of the full chancel, the Choir and Congregation singing, and the ability to zoom in and out allowing people to see the full extent of our Samctuary.

As you may have read elsewhere, Cumbernauld Churches are now part of Glasgow Presbytery.
